Diver finds Maine lobster off Southern California waters



Well, that's an odd sight. That's what diver Jim McKeeman

McKeeman was diving with a few friends in the Santa Monica Bay, on Saturday, Oct. 20, doing a regular weekend outing in search of lobsters. While the California Spiny Lobster were plentiful, he couldn't believe it when he saw a Maine lobster crawling around underwater. "I saw this guy on my last dive, he was all by himself, next to a rock," McKeeman recalled. "As I got close to him, I thought, 'This is weird. What's he doing here?""

The Maine lobster – known to be feistier than his California cousins – wasn't going to get plucked from the ocean without a fight. "He raised his claw and came at me," said McKeeman, of Tustin. "They are pretty aggressive." He thought about leaving the 4-pound lobster in the sea, but then said no one would believe him without documen-

tation. So he got his camera out and got a few photos with the crustacean.

McKeeman speculated that someone likely bought it from a restaurant and figured they could save it and let it go into the ocean. That could be the case, said Jeff Landesman, chief aquarist for the Cabrillo Marine Aquarium in San Pedro. "People get shipped lobsters from the East Coast, it could be a gift or they ordered it to cook, and they have second thoughts of throwing them in a pot and they don't know what to do with it," he said.

Landesman warns that this shouldn't be done. If lobsters not native to the area stay here and reproduce, they may decimate other shellfish that call Southern California home. There's not a big concern that east coast lobsters are invading local waters, since they don't reproduce well here, either because there's not many of them or they have trouble surviving in the water temperatures off Southern California.

When asked which ones taste better, Landesman said it's up to an individual's preference. "It depends on who you talk to," he said. "People like the Maine lobsters because of all the meat in the claws, but others say the tail of the California lobsters have more meat."

McKeeman hopes to find the answer to that question. "We're going to do a taste-test comparison when we get together to have a lobster dinner," he said, noting he will probably steam the lobster and then finish it on the grill, served with plenty of butter, of course.

McKeeman figured he was doing his part to rid Southern California of an invasive species. "He really didn't belong here anyway," he said. "If they were to take hold here and breed, that could be a problem." •

Ocean Etiquette National Marine Sanctuaries

Knowing how to interact with ocean wildlife can help you make the right decisions when you encounter wildlife. Without paying attention to how you interact in the marine environment, you are running the chance of putting endangered species, federally protected species and thousands of other species' lives at risk.

Each time someone visits the marine environment, they have the wonderful opportunity to encounter wildlife. However, the unfortunate potential to harm our marine life and resources exists with every visit. Because we love our marine resources and want you to appreciate them, the National Marine Sanctuary System sees every visitor as a potential steward of our sanctuary resources. The Ocean Etiquette program calls on each of you to take on that responsibility. We have listed below a set of general marine wildlife viewing guidelines.

Marine wildlife viewing guidelines

Learn before you go



Read about the wildlife, viewing sites and local regulations to get the most from your wildlife viewing experience. Many species live only in specific habitats such as estuaries, coral reefs, sand dunes or the open ocean. Seasonal and

daily cycles also influence when and where an animal may be located. Research on the internet, buy regional viewing guidebooks, talk with local residents and hire local guides to increase your chances of seeing marine wildlife.

Keep your distance



Use binoculars, spotting scopes and cameras with zoom lenses to get a closer look. Marine wildlife may be very sensitive to human disturbance, and if cornered, they can harm the viewer or leave the area. If wildlife approaches

you, stay calm and slowly back away or place boat engines in neutral. When closer encounters occur, do not make sudden moves or obstruct the travel path of the animals – let them have the unhindered right of way.

Hands off



Never touch, handle or ride marine wildlife. Touching wildlife, or attempting to do so, can injure the animal, put you at risk and may also be illegal for certain species. The slimy coating on fish and many marine invertebrates pro-

tects the animal from infection and is easily rubbed off with a hand, glove or foot. Avoid using gloves when diving or snorkeling to minimize the temptation to touch. Remember, wild animals may bite, body slam or even pull you underwater if startled or threatened.

Do not feed or attract marine wildlife



Feeding or attempting to attract wildlife with food, decoys, sound or light disrupts normal feeding cycles, may cause sickness or death from unnatural or contaminated food items, and habituates animals to people. Habituated animals are vulnerable to vessel strikes or vandalism, and can be dangerous to people.

Never chase or harass wildlife



Following a wild animal that is trying to escape is dangerous. Never completely surround the animal, trap an animal between a vessel and shore, block its escape route, or come between mother and young. When view-

ing from a boat, operate at slow speed, move parallel to the swimming animals, and avoid approaching head-on or from behind, and separating individuals from a group. If you are operating a non-motorized vessel, emit periodic noise to make wildlife aware of your presence and avoid surprise.

Stay away from wildlife that appears abandoned or sick do not approach sick animals icon

Some marine animals, such as seals, leave the water or are exposed at low tide as part of their natural life cycle — there may be nothing wrong with them. Young animals that appear to be orphaned may actually be under the watchful eye of a nearby parent. An animal that is sick or injured is already vulnerable and may be more likely to bite. If you think an animal is in trouble, contact the local authorities for advice.

Wildlife and pets don't mix



Wild animals can injure and spread diseases to pets, and in turn, pets can harm and disturb wildlife. For example, wild animals recognize dogs as predators and quickly flee when they see or smell dogs. If you are traveling with a

pet, always keep them on a leash and away from areas frequented by marine wildlife.

Lend a hand with trash removal



Human garbage is one of the greatest threats to marine wildlife. Carry a trash bag with you and pick up litter found along the shore and in the water. Plastic bags, floating debris and monofilament line pose the greatest risk to

wildlife. Remember, if you see litter it's because you didn't stop and pick it up!

Help others to become responsible wildlife watchers and tour operators



Speak up if you notice other viewers or tour operators behaving in a way that disturbs the wildlife or other viewers, or impacts sensitive habitats. Be friendly, respectful and discrete

when approaching others. When operating a boat, lead by example and reduce your speed in areas frequented by marine wildlife, anchor properly and encourage others to do the same. Violations of the law should be reported to local authorities.

It's up to you!



Finding Charlie

Diver Vince Tenchavez, 34, was infuriated when he discovered somebody had vandalized two live corals in the Bauan marine sanctuary in Batangas, Philippines. They had carefully engraved a name and date on them. At 130 feet deep, it could only have been done by a scuba diver. Around five feet across, the word "Charlie" had been carefully and freshly inscribed, but Tenchavez could find nobody with that name on the guest lists of the local dive centers. (Undercurrent)



For a Few Dollars More

Outside of the American sphere of influence, DIN-fitting tanks are becoming the norm, which could be a problem for those of us with International A-clamp-fitting (yoke) regulators. Most foreign dive centers provide a screw-in insert that solves the problem but some can be in a rather battered state, so wise traveling divers take their own. For a few dollars this little item in your bag can

save you a lot of grief. Consult your local dive store. (Undercurrent)

San Jose Flipper Dippers' DIVE COORDINATOR GUIDELINES

To be a dive coordinator you need only be a certified diver with some experience. It is important to remember that you are coordinating other certified divers who are diving within their training and experience limits. You should take care to not exceed that role. You should not act as a divemaster or an instructor (even if you are so qualified).



Safety should be the concern of all divers. Information such as the location of the nearest phone and whether oxygen is available should be shared by the participants. In most locations, the emergency number is 911 and is a free call.

It should be assumed that a certified diver is qualified to dive in a situation that is within the limits of his/her training with a diver of equal qualifications. If you suspect that a dive situation exceeds the qualifications of a diver, you should explain to them the potential difficulties they may encounter. However, remember that it is ultimately the diver him/herself who must make the decision as whether to dive, and he/she is ultimately responsible for his/her decision.

Follow the Club constitution: "Encourage the conservation of all marine life by obeying all Federal and State game laws and urging others to do likewise."

A Simple Ten-Point Guideline:

- 1. Choose a site/situation that you are familiar with and will enjoy.
- 2. Schedule your dive in time to be in the newsletter and announced at the Club meeting. Include the best method of contact so interested divers can contact you if they aren't at the meeting.
- **3.** Collect the sign-up sheet after the Club meeting. If you can't attend, ask another member to get it for you.
- **4.** If the dive will not occur as planned, make your best effort to contact all that expressed interest. Otherwise divers will assume the dive will occur as planned.
- **5.** Make sure non-members are appropriately certified and have signed the Club disclaimer.
- **6.** Coordinate buddy teams to make sure that all divers who need a buddy, have one.
- **7.** Tell all divers who are not familiar with the site/situation what they can expect.
- **8.** Ask divers who may want to leave early to let someone know so all divers can be accounted for.
- **9.** Try to make the dive an enjoyable and safe experience for everyone, including yourself.
- **10.** Report on the dive at the next Club meeting. If you can't attend, try to find another participant who can report.

Contact the Vice President to coordinate a dive and you'll be on your way to your **2nd Star Award!** • •

Why Even Air-Breathing Divers Should Analyze Their Tanks

Nitrox divers are taught to analyze the contents of their tanks before

using them, but now air-breathing divers should be doing it, too. With nitrox fills the norm on dive boats, on tap there and in dive shops, a new hazard lurks – when tanks of air are filled alongside tanks of nitrox, and some divers may pick the incorrect one. Tanks are not always clearly or correctly labelled.

Air which is actually nitrox 21 (meaning it is composed of approximately 21 percent oxygen and 78 percent nitrogen), is recommended for a maximum safe depth of 185ft. Nitrox 32, one of the most common mixes for recreational diving, is limited to 111ft. It has higher partialpressure amounts of oxygen, which can subject a diver to the risks of oxygen toxicity. If a diver mistakenly takes a tank of nitrox, thinking it is air, he may go too deep and suffers a life-threatening spasm (depending on an individual's susceptibility) with the likelihood of drowning. Which means we should all analyze the contents of every tank before we

go diving.

Any dive operation that provides nitrox should have a portable analyzer available. You can simply adjust it to 20.9 percent, then hold it over a tank's valve that you've opened sufficiently to supply a gentle flow of gas, and wait until

and wait until the display stabilizes. If it's air in the

tank, the display will still read 20.9 percent oxygen. ❖

A Florida Dive Gone Wrong

Undercurrent

Nwo divers went missing, in August, during a dive on the underwater shipwreck Thompson, near Tarpon Springs, FL. According to the captain of the dive boat the two men were last seen near the wreck but never resurfaced. Local law enforcement and the Coast Guard searched more than 1.700 nautical miles of the Gulf of Mexico before finding them. Michael Pavlich spent seven hours in the water, five miles southeast of the wreck. Terry Hayes was spotted nearly a day later, 12 miles farther away. Hayes kept his BC on and drank rainwater he collected with his mask. Rescuers spotted his surface marker buoy. •



Unwanted Dive Gear?

Club member Carl Tuttle had a collection of used dive gear he had obtained from folks who were no longer diving including 5 tanks, well out of hydro, a regulator with UW pressure guage and a couple of BCDs. et your shutters snapping! Here are the objectives and rules for this year's Club Photo Competition:

- 1. To encourage members to have fun taking videos or photos from our club events and special trips, sharing their best photos and competing with our fellow members. Additionally encourage new members or old members to learn photography tips from experienced photographers.
- 2. Photos must be taken during 2018 at a Flipper Dippers' coordinated event. This is any event or dive that was published in the Newsletter or mentioned at a club meeting.
- 3. A entry fee of \$5.00 per category, due when you enter your photos.
- 4. Up to four photos can be entered into three categories (either novice or advanced): Gnome Photos, Underwater, Spirit of the

Club. If more than one photo is submitted the group of photos with be judged as a collection.

- 5. Snorkel Roaming Gnomes can be purchased for \$18.99 at: www.roaminggnomestore.com/p-1294snorkel-roaming-gnomeaspx
- 6. Photo prints can be no larger than 8-1/2 x 11 inches. All photos submitted for each category must be mounted on the same piece of mounting board. For instance if you submit three Gnome photos and four underwater photos, the Gnomes must all share one mounting board as a collection and the underwater photos must share another mounting board as a collection. Mounting boards should be large enough to hold all your Photos.
- 7. Winning photos will be featured on our home page and all photos will be judged by vour peers attending our annual Flipper Dipper Awards Banquet in January 2019. The most votes for each category will be our winners. The winners will be announced at the February General meeting. There will be

- a first place prize in each category.
- **8.** There are six (6) winning categories (either novice or experienced).
- A. Novice or Experienced underwater photos.
- B. Novice or Experienced spirit of the club.
- C. Novice or Experienced Gnome picture (underwater or spirit of the club).

Novice: meaning you have been taking underwater photos for less than 10 years. Advanced: meaning Experienced photographer has an advanced camera and over 10 years experience.

Categories will include: Underwater, Spirit of the Club (above water), and Gnome either spirit or underwater. These photos can be edited if preferred.

9. Entries must be submitted by January 12, 2019, one week before the Annual Awards Banquet. Photos must have been taken in 2018 at a Flipper Dipper coordinated event. This is an event or dive that was published in the Newsletter or mentioned at a club meeting. 😂
