- Show SCUBA certification from a nationally recognized certification agency.
- 2. Log ten (10) dives with the Club.
- 3. Dive to 60 feet in the ocean on a Club dive.

- 2. Have current CPR AND First Aid certification.




Ed. Note: Grace hasn't been to a General Meeting in-person for some time and attended so she could pay her Club dues. Wow! That \$50 just covered them!




Howard Timoney, above, helped the meeting by selling raffle tickets. He's a winner too!

December S3 Dive Report

Due to extremely poor forecasts for December 14, the December S3 dive was moved to The Breakwater on December 21. Very few divers were there and parking was wide open as we suspect many looked at the forecast for poor conditions and decided to sleep in. Since the ocean was projected to get rougher as the day went on, Dippers Carl Tuttle, Eva Alexander, Ken Ager, Jeff Rowland, and Grace Chi geared up quickly for the first dive out to the Metridium Fields, uncertain what to expect. Carl had a malfunction with his mask and luckily Ken had an extra on hand to loan him. The ocean was calm and we were able to see the bottom as we swam out.

After descending we found the pipe (Grace signaled to Carl that he swam right over it - of corse he blamed it on Ken's spare mask fogging up!) and made our way to the fields, where we saw plenty of metridiums, large fishes, etc, and some divers even got buzzed by a sea lion. Visibility was well above average at 30-40 feet and water temperature was in the low 50s as usual.

For the second dive, we dove the Breakwater wall. Interesting sightings included a cormorant and octopus. Schools of fishes were out in full force and the sea lions joined us barking and blowing bubbles as they buzzed our group of divers. Visibility was again above average although the ocean had definitely picked up when we exited. Both dives were about 50 minutes.

Towards the very end of the dive on the way back in to shore, Carl had an encounter with a fisherman's hook and he was pulled up to the surface from about 8 feet! The hook had snagged the cloth mask strap and the line wrapped around his snorkel nearly pulling his mask off. At the surface he pulled out his trusty "Mike Nelson, Sea Hunt Dive Knife" and cut the line. This is a reason we should all carry a knife, or



line cutting device, when diving in the Monterey Bay.

After everyone got dressed, we enjoyed hot clam chowder and pizza for lunch at Piccolo, a new Italian restaurant, on the Breakwater where Pig Wizard used to be. •

DOUBLE DIPPERS DOUBLE UP WITH THE GOLDEN DIPPY!

t the December General Meeting there was a bit of an issue with the lock on the front door to the Knight's Hall. Two out of three keys wouldn't work in the lock. We were finally able to get in and hold our meeting. As the last of the Dippers exited the building, Carl Tuttle closed the door and everything was secure. Fifteen seconds later. Entangled humpback whale breaches off Newport Beach

Rescue teams search for entangled whale off Orange County coast

Ahumpback whale that had been thrilling boaters off Newport Beach, Ca., for several days breached for a prolonged period, revealing that the mammal is hardly free and thriving.

The Instagram post by Mark Girardeau highlights "the tragedy of yet another human-created problem" in the form of a commercial fishing rope running through the whale's mouth and wound tightly around its right pectoral fin. "We're hoping the best for this whale!" Girardeau, who was with Newport Coastal Adventure, stated in his description. "Rescue teams are on the lookout for this whale to be sighted again."

Even if a NOAA-trained rescue team locates the juvenile whale, approaching for an attempt to cut or loosen the rope would be challenging and dangerous – perhaps impossible if the whale is breaching or actively feeding. Alisa Schulman-Janiger, a researcher, stated via Facebook that the whale was probably trying to free itself when it breached repeatedly for 2.5 hours.

She added that the whale could lose its pectoral fin because the rope is wound so tightly. It's unclear when or where the whale became entangled, but ropes attached to crab and lobster gear always pose threats to whales.

Aerial photos shot by Mark Girardeau also shows rope caught in the humpback whale's mouth. Girardeau was among a number of photographers capturing footage of the whale.

While trained rescuers would love to free the whale, they might not get an opportunity because humpback whales presently off Southern California are migrating to Mexico for the winter. The whale is known to science, cataloged by Happy Whale as HW-MN0503323, and has been documented five times since 2023 between Morro Bay and San Diego.

Video recorded by Davey's Locker and Newport Landing Whale Watching, that was shared with KTLA TV, shows what appears to be a strong piece of fishing line wrapped around the pectoral fin and through the mouth of a humpback whale.

A whale entanglement response team has been notified and is searching for the whale, which is one of a large number of humpbacks that have been showing up over the past several months, to see if they can help. "The fear is that it will become so tight around the whale's pectoral fin that it might end up in an amputation of the whale. It could prevent the whale from feeding. It definitely will slow them down and make them sick," spokesperson Jessica Rodriguez said. "So, hopefully, it will become disentangled at some point."

As for now, the whale-watching groups are keeping an eye out and notifying rescuers of any sightings. There are concerns however about how to safely remove the entanglement even if the distressed whale is spotted.

bitten on the leg by a nurse shark in the Maldives at Alimathaa Island, Vaavu Atoll. The sharks tend to mass near a dock used by fishing boats. Her injuries were superficial, and she posted a video of the incident on Instagram.
